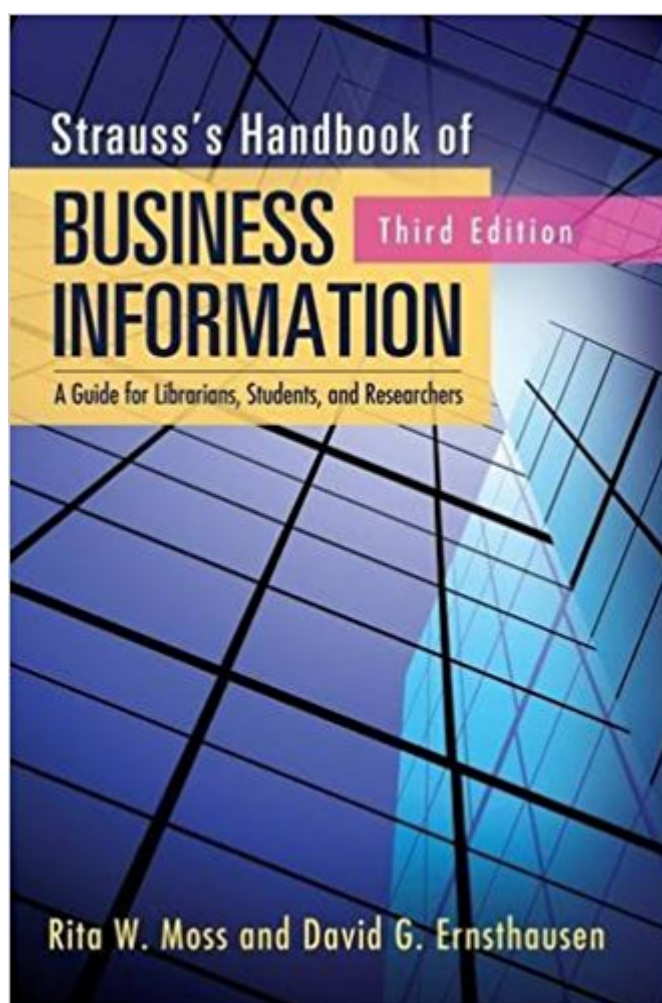


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# Strauss's Handbook Of Business Information: A Guide For Librarians, Students, And Researchers, 3rd Edition
